



What is Wesley House?

Wesley House is a small community of Methodist scholars and students at the heart of the University city of Cambridge.

Since 1921 it has been a gateway for students in the Wesleyan tradition to the excellent resources for learning in the University of Cambridge and, since 1972, to the shared resources of the globally significant Cambridge Theological Federation (a unique collaboration between Anglican, Reformed, Catholic, Orthodox, and Methodist communities of prayer and study).

We now work primarily at the post-graduate (Masters and Doctoral) research level, encouraging research activities that reflect the vision of Michael Gutteridge, our founder, for an informed Wesleyan contribution to church and society.

We have a range of study opportunities available for people engaged in ministry who wish to study part time or who might come to Cambridge for a short course or sabbatical.

What programmes of study are available?

Doctor of Ministry (DMin) – NEW

Developed together with Wesley Theological Seminary, Washington for active clergy from across the globe who are seeking to enhance their leadership skills and practices. Courses include *Leadership in the Wesleyan Spirit*, taught by Dr Lovett Weems; *Reclaiming Wesleyan Theology for Ministry*, taught by Dr Ted Campbell, and *Spirituality for Personal and Congregational Formation*, taught by Dr Jane Leach.

"Each cohort of students in this DMin track will be international in character with colleagues and dialogue that reflect the global nature of today's church," says Bruce Birch. "The faculty teaching these courses will also be drawn from the best scholar-teachers available in the global church."

The DMin is taught in two fortnight residential blocks per year at Wesley House (either January/June or April/August), beginning January 2016 and recruiting now. Applicants must have a theology degree and three years' ministry experience.

Professional Doctorate in Practical Theology

A part-time research degree for those engaged in ministry or church practice of some kind who wish to investigate a topic of relevance to that context. The doctorate is structured in two parts: the first comprises three short papers; the second constitutes the major piece of research. There are bi-monthly research seminars, regular supervisions, and an annual summer school.

PhD

Research degrees both full time and part time are available through the University of Cambridge and Anglia Ruskin University.

MA in Pastoral Theology

A full time or part time degree for graduates of theology engaged in ministry which can be taught in Cambridge face-to-face or at distance and by summer school. This degree is taught by expert staff from the Cambridge Theological Federation and involves small group teaching from across the ecumenical spectrum of the Federation. Modules include *Pastoral Theology in History and Practice* taught by Dr Zoe Bennett, *Children's Spirituality* taught by Dr Rebecca Nye, *Contemporary Spirituality* taught by Dr Adrian Chatfield, and *Pastoral Reflective Practice in Healthcare* taught by Dr Derek Fraser at Addenbrooke's Hospital.
